Manufacturers' Retention and Growth Fund (S.1066)

S.1066 was designed to provide incentives for the more than 4,000 small and medium manufacturers in South Carolina. The legislation received 2nd reading by a vote of 43-0. (February 4, 2010)

Department of Employment and Workforce (H.3442)

The "McConnell/Rankin/Knotts Amendment" to the creation of the Department of Employment and Workforce legislation would have created a joint legislative screening committee and stripped gubernatorial at-will powers. The amendment was tabled by a vote of 23-18. (February 24, 2010)

Secret Ballot (H.3305)

H.3305 is a state constitutional amendment to protect the rights of workers to cast secret ballots in union elections. The legislation's intent is to combat the dangerous federal "card check" legislation. The resolution received third reading in the Senate by a vote of 33-9. (March 10, 2010)

Spending Limits (S.1)

S.1 amends the state constitution to provide spending limits for South Carolina, using a 10 year average and implementing a budget stabilization fund. The Senate failed to receive the 31 votes necessary to give the constitutional amendment third reading by a vote of 28-13. (March 30, 2010)

General Reserve Fund (H.3395)

The Senate voted to override Governor Mark Sanford's veto of H.3395, legislation to increase the state's General Reserve Fund from three to five percent, by a vote of 27-8. (May 6, 2010)

Unemployment Insurance (UI) Trust Fund (S.391)

The "O'Dell Amendment" to the Unemployment Insurance (UI) Trust Fund legislation would have shifted nearly \$90 million from employers who heavily use the UI system to those who rarely or never use the system. The amendment was tabled by a vote of 31-10. (May 12, 2010)

Textile Revitalization (S.728)

The Senate concurred with the House amendments to S.728, legislation revising the amount and applicability of tax credits allowed for textile revitalization, by a vote of 41-0. (May 12, 2010)

Cigarette Tax (H.3584)

The General Assembly passed a 50-cent increase to the state's cigarette tax, which is expected to generate approximately \$135 million annually. Governor Mark Sanford vetoed the increase, and the Senate overrode his veto by a vote of 33-13. (May 13, 2010)

Tort Reform (H.3489)

H.3489 was a comprehensive tort reform bill that placed caps on punitive damages, placed limits on appeals bonds and repealed the prohibition of the non-use of seatbelts, among other items. The Senate voted to set tort reform legislation for special order by a vote of 29-10. (May 19, 2010)

Manufacturers' Retention and Growth Fund Amendment (H.4478)

The Senate adopted the "SC Small Manufacturers' Retention and Growth Fund" amendment by a vote of 27-12. The amendment was offered by Sen. Billy O'Dell and designed to provide incentives for small and medium manufacturers in South Carolina. (June 2, 2010)

Unemployment Credits Amendment (H.4478)

The Senate adopted the "Unemployment Credits" amendment by a vote of 36-0. The amendment was offered by Sen. Harvey Peeler and designed to give an employer a state tax credit for hiring an unemployed person receiving unemployment benefits. (June 2, 2010)

Technical College Funding (Veto 19)

Governor Mark Sanford vetoed the entire operational funding for the South Carolina Technical College System, the agency responsible for increasing the employability of South Carolinians. The Senate overrode the veto by a vote of 41-3. (June 16, 2010)

Economic Development (H.4478)

The Senate adopted a conference committee report on H.4478, economic development legislation that includes modernizing a port tax credit, revamping the endowed chairs program and extending fee-in-lieu agreements for manufacturing property, by a vote of 24-14. (June 16, 2010)

Employment Security Commission Reform (H.4303)

The House passed a joint resolution, placing disqualification parameters on unemployment benefit payouts from the Employment Security Commission, by a vote of 112-1. (January 14, 2010)

State Attorney Fees (S.186)

The legislation controls attorney fees in state initiated actions, limiting the fee based on time expended at a reasonable rate. The House gave the bill second reading by a vote of 95-3. (January 20, 2010)

Sunset Review Commission (H.3192)

H.3192 would have provided a sunset review division of the South Carolina Legislative Audit Council to evaluate programs for state agencies. The bill was given second reading by a vote of 108-0. (February 25, 2010)

Secretary of State Restructuring (H.4475)

H.4475 was a joint resolution to make the office of Secretary of State a position appointed by the governor rather than an elected office. The House adopted the legislation by a vote of 85-30. (February 25, 2010)

Union Dues (H.3736)

H.3736 would have made it unlawful for union dues to be deducted from an employee's wages without a signed authorization for the deductions. The House gave second reading to the legislation by a vote of 87-26. (March 3, 2010)

Tort Reform (H.3489)

H.3489 was a comprehensive tort reform bill that placed caps on punitive damages, placed limits on appeals bonds and repealed the prohibition of the non-use of seatbelts, among other items. The House passed H.3489 by a vote of 104-9. (March 3, 2010)

Economic Development (H.4478)

Economic development legislation that includes modernizing a port tax credit, revamping the endowed chairs program and extending fee-in-lieu agreements for manufacturing property, passed the House by a vote of 82-24. (March 4, 2010)

Secret Ballot (H.3305)

H.3305 is a state constitutional amendment to protect the rights of workers to cast secret ballots in union elections. The legislation's intent is to combat the dangerous federal "card check" legislation. The House concurred with the Senate amendments by a vote of 106-12. (March 10, 2010)

General Reserve Fund (H.3396)

The House adopted a conference report on H.3396, legislation to increase the state's general reserve fund from three to five percent, by a vote of 92-13. (April 13, 2010)

Permit Extensions (H.4445)

The House concurred with the Senate amendments to H.4445, legislation extending permits affecting the development of real property in South Carolina, by a vote of 100-1. (May 6, 2010)

Cigarette Tax (H.3584)

The General Assembly passed a 50-cent increase to the state's cigarette tax, which is expected to generate approximately \$135 million annually. Governor Mark Sanford vetoed the increase, and the House overrode the veto by a vote of 90-29. (May 12, 2010)

Unemployment Insurance (UI) Trust Fund (S.391)

The House concurred in the Senate amendments to S.391, legislation to restructure the Unemployment Insurance (UI) Trust Fund and restore its solvency, by a vote of 96-1. (May 20, 2010)

Manufacturers' Retention and Growth Fund (S.1066)

S.1066 was designed to provide incentives for the more than 4,000 small and medium manufacturers in South Carolina. The House moved to continue the legislation, a vote to defeat the bill, by a vote of 64-35. (May 25, 2010)

Spending Limits (S.2)

The House passed S.2, statutory language to limit state spending to CPI plus population growth, by a vote of 73-24. (May 26, 2010)

Technical College Funding (Veto 19)

Governor Mark Sanford vetoed the entire operational funding for the South Carolina Technical College System, the agency responsible for increasing the employability of South Carolinians. The House overrode the veto by a vote of 116-1. (June 16, 2010)
